espionage thrillers. But in a bin, I also found one of the most gorgeous sets of classic literature I'd ever seen.

I've been reading through those classics lately and am amazed at how well they hold up. My favorite so far is *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* by Robert Louis Stevenson. Some scholars think this novella—i.e., a short novel you can read in one sitting—is a metaphor for drug addiction.

The book is one of many options to choose from in our church library. We have biographies, Anabaptist theology, peace perspectives, fiction, and more. The library is a great resource for students, as well as those wanting to explore the Christian faith. I've used it often for sermon prep, personal enjoyment, and for seminary assignments. On March 9, representatives from Mennonite congregations across the state gathered at Menno Haven for the Illinois Mennonite Conference (IMC) Annual Assembly. Pastor Barb and I attended as LMC's delegates. Lyle Bohnert also attended as a member of the Missional Leadership Team (MLT), the governing board for IMC.

We spent time worshiping and hearing reports from area congregations and representatives of Mennonite agencies and institutions. Andrew Suderman of Mennonite Mission Network and Eastern Mennonite University was our keynote speaker. He offered a thought-



provoking reflection on the Parable of the Growing Seed from Mark 4.

During the business session, we approved the annual spending plan. For several years, the conference has been accumulating surplus funds since there has been no conference minister. We also approved new members for conference leadership positions. The MLT noted that they hope to find a moderator-elect sometime this year as current moderator Darrel Miller's term is ending.

Conference leaders also shared two options aimed at resolving disagreements regarding pastors officiating at same-sex weddings and credentialing of pastors in same-sex relationships. They plan to share these proposals with IMC congregations and invite feedback.
